

CEO Detroit - Voter Registration Guide



In Michigan, You're Eligible to Vote if:

- You are not in state prison or federal prison for a felony conviction.
- You *can* vote if you have been released from incarceration, but you'll have to register or re-register.
- You can vote while on parole or probation.
- Check with your parole officer or you can check if you're eligible to vote online at https://campaignlegal.org/restoreyourvote
- You're a United States citizen and a resident of Michigan and the county, city, or village for at least 30 days before Election Day
- You're at least 18 years old on Election Day
- You are not found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- Due to voter rolls being purged, sometimes individuals who are eligible and registered to vote are removed. You can check whether you're still registered to vote https://www.vote.org/am-i-registered-to-vote/

Where and How to Register to Vote in Wayne County

To register online:

You can register to vote online at https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/:

 To register online you will need your Michigan driver license or New York identification card number, the last four digits of your social security number, and your date of birth.

You can register to vote by mail with the form found on this page, https://www.waynecounty.com/elected/clerk/voter-applications.aspx.

 You need to sign and mail the voter registration form at least 15 days before Election Day. Mail the registration form to the Wayne County Board of Elections at

Where and When to Vote in Detroit

- The 2020 Presidential election will take place on **Tuesday, November 3rd**.
- You can vote in person or by mail before Election Day. You can find the nearest place to vote at https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/.
- If you vote by mail, the ballot must reach the Elections Office by 8PM on Election Day. (This means that if you plan to mail your ballot, you need to mail in your ballot early enough to reach the office by that time in order for your vote to be counted.)

Additional Information

- If you have already registered to vote but have since moved, be sure to re-register at your new address.
- Under Michigan state law, no companies are required by law to give you time off of work to vote. Make sure to go to the polls either before or after your work shift on that day. Alternatively, you can vote by mail.
