



CEO Tulsa - Voter Registration Guide



In Oklahoma, You're Eligible to Vote if:

- You can *not* vote while you are in state prison or federal prison for a felony conviction.
- You *can* vote when the term of your original sentence ends (if you were sentenced to 10 years, you can vote 10 years after your sentencing).
- You *can not* vote while on parole or probation, but you can vote when you are done with parole or probation.
- Check with your parole officer or you can check if you're eligible to vote online at <https://campaignlegal.org/restoreyourvote>
- You're a United States citizen and a resident of Oklahoma and the county, city, or village for at least 30 days before Election Day
- You're at least 18 years old on Election Day
- You are not found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- Due to voter rolls being purged, sometimes individuals who are eligible and registered to vote are removed. You can check whether you're still registered to vote <https://www.vote.org/am-i-registered-to-vote/>

Where and How to Register to Vote in Tulsa County

To register online:

You can register to vote online at

https://www.ok.gov/elections/Voter_Info/Register_to_Vote/index.html

- To register online you will need your Oklahoma driver license or Oklahoma identification card number, the last four digits of your social security number, and your date of birth.
- You need to sign and mail the voter registration form **at least 25 days before** Election Day. Mail the registration form to the Tulsa County Board of Elections at

- If you will need your ballot mailed to you, you will need to fill out a separate Absentee Ballot Form. More information can be found at https://www.ok.gov/elections/Voter_Info/Absentee_Voting/index.html.



Where and When to Vote in Tulsa

- The 2020 Presidential election will take place on **Tuesday, November 3rd**.
- You can vote in person or by mail before Election Day. You can find the nearest place to vote at <https://okvoterportal.okelections.us/>.
- If you vote by mail, the ballot must reach the Elections Office by 7PM on Election Day. **(This means that if you plan to mail your ballot, you need to mail in your ballot early enough to reach the office by that time in order for your vote to be counted.)**

Additional Information

- If you have already registered to vote but have since moved, be sure to re-register at your new address.
- Under Oklahoma state law, employees get 2 hours of paid time off to vote unless the employee's workday begins 3 hours after the polls open or ends 3 hours before the polls close. Proof of voting during the paid time off is required. Alternatively, you can vote by mail.
